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GENERAL LEASE – RECREATIONAL AND PROTECTIVE STRUCTURE USE

APPLICANT:

Charles R. Dietz, Trustee of the Charles R. Dietz Revocable Living Trust, Dated July 18, 2007

PROPOSED LEASE:

AREA, LAND TYPE, AND LOCATION:

Sovereign land in the Sacramento River, adjacent to 3031 Garden Highway, near Sacramento, Sacramento County.

AUTHORIZED USE:

Continued use and maintenance of an existing boat dock, gangway, two 2-pile dolphins, and one piling previously authorized by the Commission, and a boat lift, two personal watercraft landings, and bank protection not previously authorized by the Commission.

LEASE TERM:

10 years, beginning April 27, 2017.

CONSIDERATION:

Boat dock with boat lift, two personal watercraft landings, gangway, two 2-pile dolphins, and one piling: \$287 per year, with an annual Consumer Price Index adjustment.

Bank protection: Public use and benefit, with the State reserving the right, at any time, to set a monetary rent if the Commission finds such action to be in the State's best interests.

SPECIFIC LEASE PROVISIONS:

Liability insurance in an amount no less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence.

STAFF ANALYSIS AND RECOMMENDATION:

Authority:

Public Resources Code sections 6005, 6216, 6301, 6501.1, 6503, and 6503.5; California Code of Regulations, title 2, sections 2000 and 2003.

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Public Trust and State's Best Interests Analysis:

On May 10, 2007, the Commission authorized a 10-year Recreational Pier Lease to Charles R. Dietz, Trustee of the Charles R. Dietz Family Revocable Living Trust ([Item C08, May 10, 2007](#)). That lease expired on April 26, 2017. The Applicant is now applying for a General Lease – Recreational and Protective Structure Use for the existing improvements. The subject improvements are privately owned and maintained. The adjacent upland parcel is privately owned and developed with a residence.

The floating boat dock, gangway and appurtenant facilities are for the docking and mooring of boats. Recreational boating is water-dependent and generally consistent with the common law Public Trust Doctrine. The California Legislature has identified private recreational boating facilities as an authorized use of Public Trust lands (Pub. Resources Code, § 6503.5). The bank protection will maintain and improve the integrity of the river channel, which will help protect the Public Trust resource of the river for recreational and navigational purposes by the public.

The subject facilities have existed for many years at this location, the lease does not alienate the State's fee simple interest, and neither permanently impairs public rights. The proposed lease includes certain provisions protecting the public use of the proposed lease area, including a limited lease term of 10 years and a non-exclusive use provision. Upon termination of the lease, the lessee may be required to remove any improvements and restore the lease premises to their original condition.

The proposed lease requires the lessee to insure the lease premises and indemnify the State for any liability incurred as a result of the lessee's activities thereon. The lease also requires the payment of annual rent to compensate the people of the State for the occupation of the public land involved.

Climate Change:

Climate change impacts including sea-level rise, increased wave activity, storm events, and flooding are not limited to the open coast. The existing structures within the proposed lease area are located along the Sacramento River within a tidally-influenced region. The subject facilities are vulnerable to flooding at current sea levels and at a higher risk of flood exposure given future projected scenarios of sea-level rise. The facilities associated with this lease area include an existing floating boat dock with boat lift, two personal watercraft landings, an adjustable gangway, two 2-pile dolphins, one piling, and bank protection.

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By 2030, California's coast could see up to 1 foot of sea-level rise (from year 2000 levels), 2 feet by 2050, and possibly more than 5 feet by 2100 (National Research Council 2012). This effect could increase the Sacramento River's inundation levels within the lease area. Rising sea levels can lead to increased flooding through regular inundation and larger flooding events when combined with tidal events and storm surges. These climate change and sea-level rise impacts can also affect erosion and sedimentation rates through increased wave action and scour, which in turn can lead to decreased shoreline stability and structure. In addition, as stated in *Safeguarding California* (California Natural Resources Agency 2014), climate change is projected to increase the frequency and severity of natural disasters related to flooding, drought, and storms (especially when coupled with sea-level rise).

Climate change could have a number of impacts for the region. The amount and timing of snowmelt runoff will likely change such that runoff pulses are earlier in the season and stronger precipitation events will occur over a shorter period of time. This is because warming temperatures will result in more water falling as rain rather than snow, earlier spring snowmelt, and less snowpack overall. In rivers and tidally influenced waterways, more frequent and powerful storms can result in increased flooding conditions and damage from storm-created debris. In addition, there will be greater amounts of runoff because less water will be trapped at higher altitudes in snowpack. Conversely, climate-change induced droughts could decrease river levels and flow for extended periods of time. Climate change and sea-level rise will further influence coastal and riverine areas by changing erosion and sedimentation rates. In rivers and tidally influenced waterways, flooding and storm flow will likely increase scour decreasing bank stability and structure.

The combination of these projected conditions could potentially raise the likelihood of damage to structures within the lease premises during the term of the lease. For example, the potential for more frequent and stronger storm events may expose the lease area structures to higher flood risks and cause structures to be damaged or dislodged, presenting hazards to public safety, as well as dangers for navigation within the channel. Conversely, prolonged drought conditions could lower water levels exposing previously submerged structures to the elements potentially leading to increased wear and tear on the pilings and dock, reduce navigability of the channel thereby increasing hazards, and impact the function and utility of the lease area structures.

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The floating boat dock with boat lift, personal watercraft floats, and gangway are adaptable to variable water levels, allowing them to rise and fall with storms and droughts and increasing their resiliency to some climate change impacts, but may require more frequent maintenance to ensure continued function during and after storm seasons and to avoid dislodgement of dock facilities. The two fixed 2-pile dolphins and piling may need to be reinforced to withstand higher levels of flood exposure. The bank protection provides some stability and reduces the amount of erosion and scour pressure that the area may experience during future events; however, the bank remains at risk of accelerated deterioration from currents and floods. Regular maintenance of the existing structures, as required by the terms of the lease, will reduce the likelihood of severe structural degradation or dislodgement.

Conclusion:

For all the reasons above, staff believes the issuance of this lease will not substantially interfere with Public Trust needs at this location, at this time, and for the foreseeable term of the proposed lease, is consistent with the common law Public Trust Doctrine and is in the best interests of the State.

OTHER PERTINENT INFORMATION:

1. This action is consistent with Strategy 1.1 of the Commission's Strategic Plan to deliver the highest levels of public health and safety in the protection, preservation, and responsible economic use of the lands and resources under the Commission's jurisdiction.
2. Staff recommends that the Commission find that this activity is exempt from the requirements of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) as a categorically exempt project. The project is exempt under Class 1, Existing Facilities; California Code of Regulations, title 2, section 2905, subdivision (a)(2).

Authority: Public Resources Code section 21084 and California Code of Regulations, title 14, section 15300 and California Code of Regulations, title 2, section 2905.

3. This activity involves lands identified as possessing significant environmental values pursuant to Public Resources Code section 6370 et seq., but such activity will not affect those significant lands. Based upon staff's consultation with the persons nominating such lands and through the CEQA review process, it is staff's opinion that the project, as proposed, is consistent with its use classification.

It is recommended that the Commission:

CEQA FINDING:

Find that the activity is exempt from the requirements of CEQA pursuant to California Code of Regulations, title 14, section 15061 as a categorically exempt project, Class 1, Existing Facilities; California Code of Regulations, title 2, section 2905, subdivision (a)(2).

PUBLIC TRUST AND STATE'S BEST INTERESTS:

Find that the proposed lease will not substantially interfere with the Public Trust needs and values at this location at this time, or for the foreseeable term of the lease, is consistent with the common law Public Trust Doctrine, and is in the best interests of the State.

SIGNIFICANT LANDS INVENTORY FINDING:

Find that this activity is consistent with the use classification designated by the Commission for the land pursuant to Public Resources Code section 6370 et seq.

AUTHORIZATION:

Authorize issuance of a General Lease – Recreational and Protective Structure Use to Charles R. Dietz, Trustee of the Charles R. Dietz Revocable Living Trust, Dated July 18, 2007; beginning April 27, 2017, for a term of 10 years, for the continued use and maintenance of an existing boat dock, gangway, two 2-pile dolphins, and one piling, previously authorized by the Commission and a boat lift, two personal watercraft landings, and bank protection not previously authorized by the Commission, as described in Exhibit A and shown on Exhibit B (for reference purposes only) attached and by this reference made a part hereof; consideration for the boat dock with boat lift, two personal watercraft landings, gangway, two 2-pile dolphins, and one piling: \$287 per year, with an annual Consumer Price Index adjustment; consideration for the bank protection: the public use and benefit, with the State reserving the right at any time to set a monetary rent if the Commission finds such action to be in the State's best interests; and liability insurance in an amount no less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence.

LAND DESCRIPTION

A parcel of tide and submerged land situate in the bed of the Sacramento River, lying adjacent to Swamp and Overflowed Land Survey 284, certificate of purchase dated March 12, 1860, County of Sacramento, State of California and more particularly described as follows:

All those lands underlying an existing boat dock with a boat lift, gangway, two personal watercraft landings, two 2-pile dolphins, and one piling lying adjacent to that parcel described in Grant Deed, recorded September 17, 2003 in Book 20030917 at Page 0718 in Official Records of said County.

TOGETHER WITH that land lying immediately beneath any Bank Protection Structure adjacent to that parcel described in said Grant Deed.

EXCEPTING THEREFROM any portion lying landward of the ordinary high water mark of the left bank of said river.

Accompanying plat is hereby made part of this description.

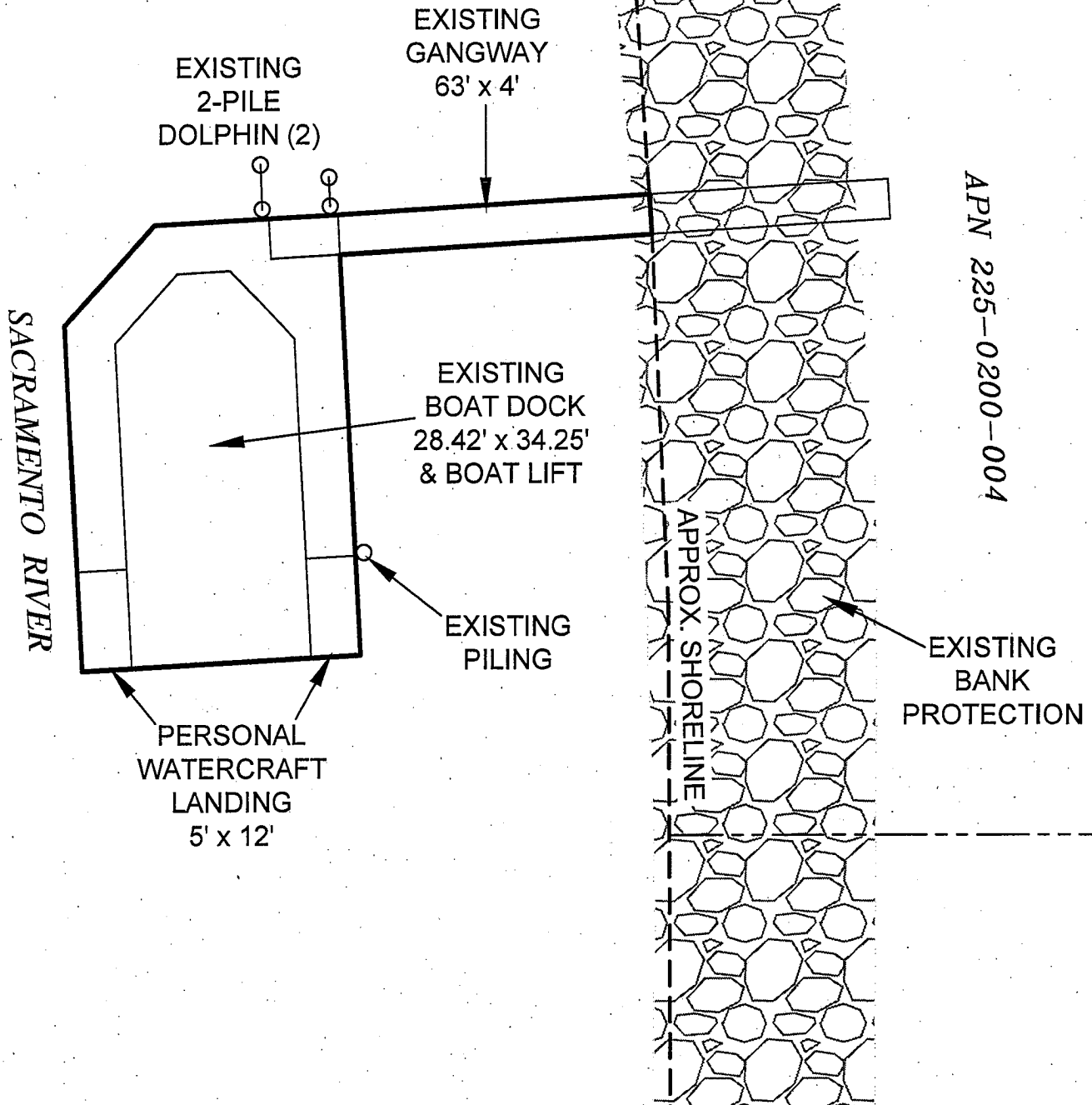

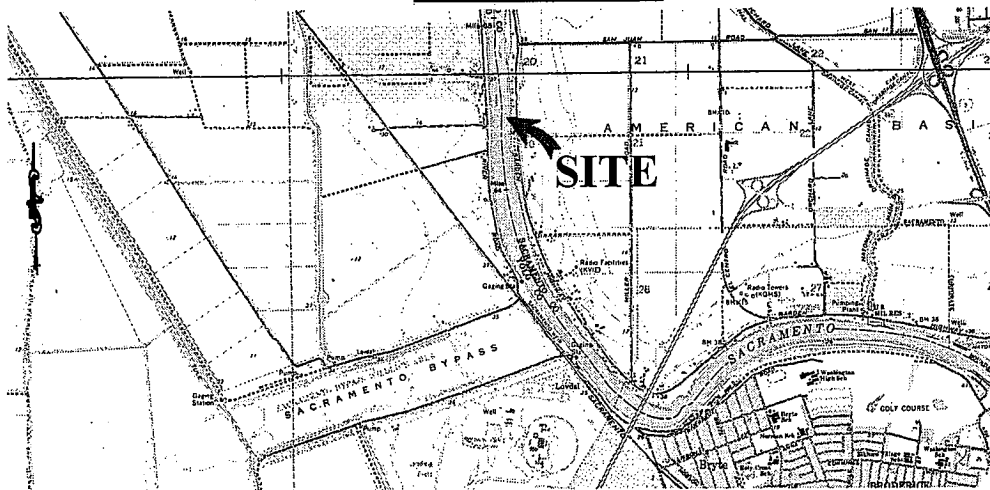
