- Lack of public information



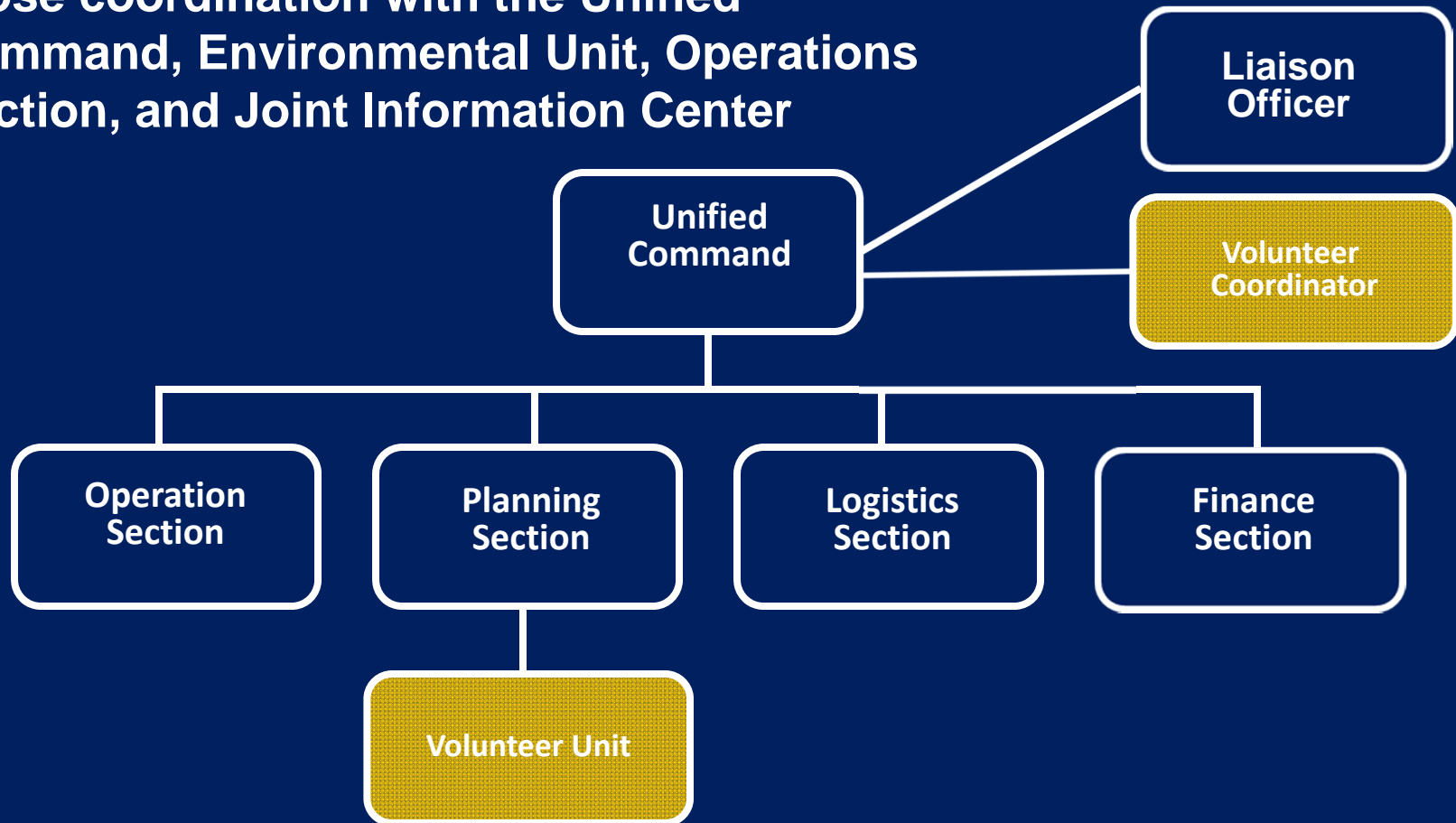
Relevant Plans

Incident Command System Volunteer Coordinator / Unit

- Close coordination with the Unified Command, Environmental Unit, Operations Section, and Joint Information Center





Volunteer Requirements

- At least 18 years old
- In good physical health
- Attend health and safety training
- Incident Command System training





Volunteer Requirements



Required Forms:

- **Volunteer Service Agreement**
- **Photo Release**
- **Volunteer Skills**
- **Social Media Agreement**

- Just-in-time trained



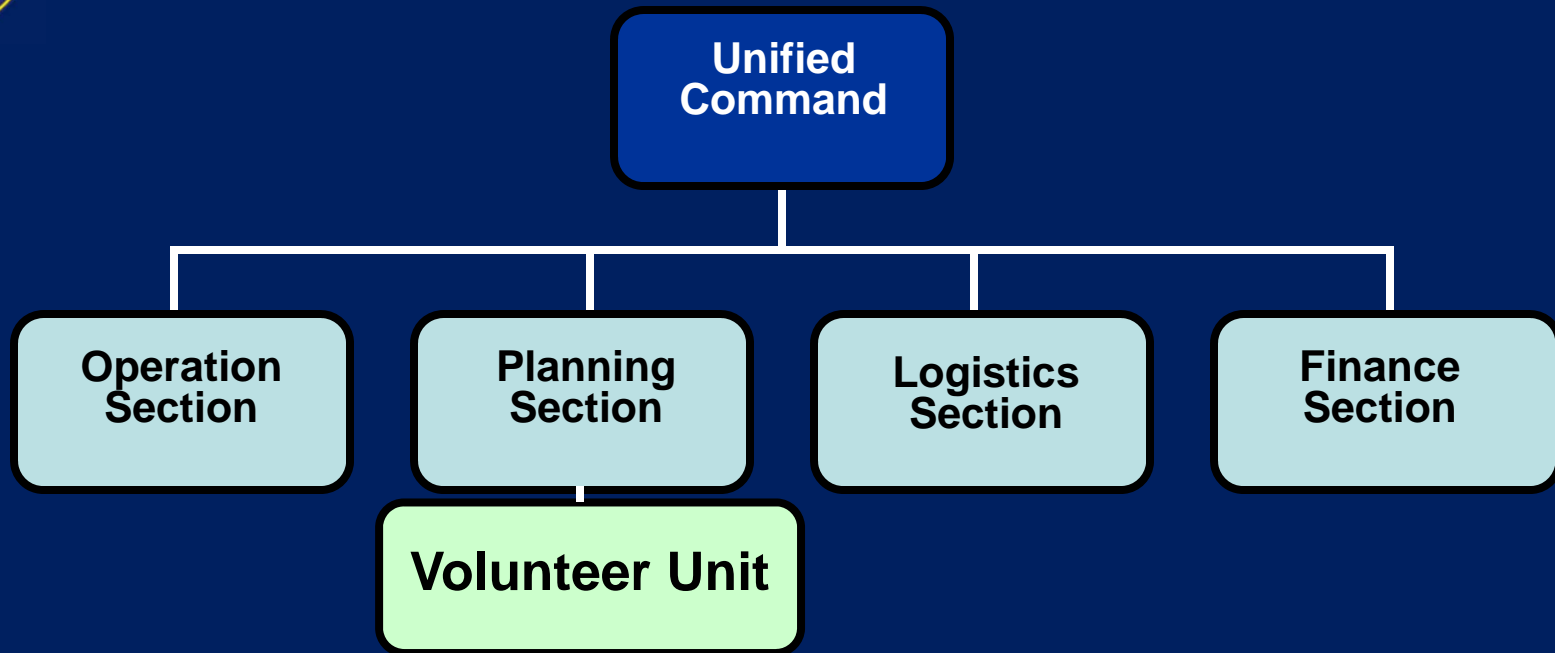

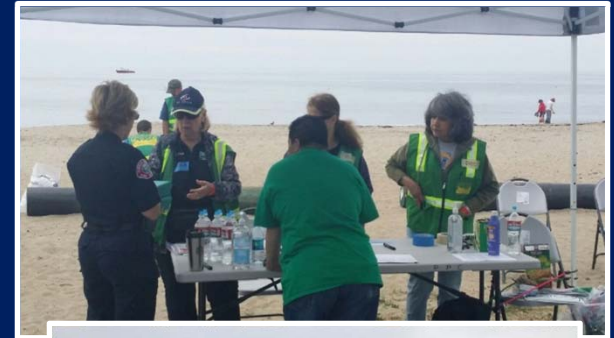

Volunteer use expanded:

- OSPR extended HAZCOM training to community members
- Tar ball cleanup operations

REFUGIO SPILL RESPONSE VOLUNTEER OPPORTUNITIES

The Volunteer Coordination Agency is the California Department of Fish and Wildlife's (CDFW) Office of Spill Prevention and Response, working with CalVolunteer, Governor's Office of Emergency Services, and Santa Barbara County Office of Emergency Management.

Specialized training is required by Cal-OSHA to ensure volunteer and wildlife safety. Without proper training, well-meaning members of the community can do more harm than good.

Volunteer Snapshot



Affiliated/Community Volunteers:

- Number of Volunteers Trained: 263
- Number of Volunteers Deployed: 159

OSPR/OWCN Pre-trained Volunteers:

- Pre-trained Volunteers Deployed: 77
- OWCN Network Organizations: 21



Challenges

- No early presence from government agencies on the shorelines
- Environmentally conscious community
- Phases not clear in the initial stage of the incident
- Early in the response - lacked community volunteer opportunities





Successes

- **LA/LB ACP Non-Wildlife Volunteer Plan**
- **Multi-agency support in the VU**
- **Use of Pre-trained/Affiliated volunteers early in the response**
- **Online volunteer registration**
- **Utilized Community volunteers**
- **Community Open House**
- **No reported volunteer injuries**
